Our first monthly Cowboy Action match was a month later than normal but 28 cowboys and cowgirls came out to dust the rust off their shooting skills.

After completing 5 fast and furious stages the overall winner was Doc Roy L Pain who also shot a clean match. Finishing 2nd and DSC's top finisher was J.J. Longley. J.J. also shot clean, as did DSC's Nine Finger Bob, DSC's Terrebonne Bud, and Outrider Outlaw.

Special attention needs to go to DSC's Rifle Rick (pictured, receiving encouragement from Dodge City Dick), who competed in his first CAS match and left with a smile on his face and a promise to return for more shooting action.



On May 18th spring was trying to arrive in Rocky River. We had clear skies and 66-degree temps under sunny skies. After 5 fun stages with some different target sequences and after Camptown tallied the scores of 45 shooters, J.J. Longley managed to

shoot clean and claim top honors for the day. Joining him with clean matches were Bad Brass, Catlow, Cactus Kay, Soaring Red Hawk, Camptown, Rodent, Henry Moon, and DSC's Terrebonne Bud.

June 1, 2014 is our next Wild Bunch match of the season. We will shoot 5 Wild Bunch stages followed by a light lunch and invite all to come out and try this shooting sport. We do have the SASS sanctioned Wild Bunch classes recognized but if you don't have all the Wild Bunch gear, no problem. We have an open class where you can shoot any caliber CAS lever action rifle and any CAS shotgun you may own. All you need is ANY semi automatic pistol that shoots LEAD bullets and you are ready for a Wild Bunch experience. A typical wild bunch stage could be 20 pistol, 10 rifle, and 6 shotgun. So if you want plenty of shooting and action, this might just be "your cup of tea".

Our next Cowboy match is on Father's Day, Sunday, June 15th.

Shooting contest to raise funds for Lone Ranger parade

An afternoon of Old West-themed fun and fancy shooting is being organized by Oxford resident Melissa Morrison.

Dubbed the "Silver Bullet Shoot-off," this first annual event will take place at the Bald Mountain shooting range in Orion Township on Monday, July 14 at 3 p.m.

The event will serve as a fund-raiser for the second annual Lone Ranger parade set to roll along M-24 through Oxford on Saturday, Aug. 2.

"My goal is to clear at least \$1,000," Morrison said. "I really enjoyed last year's parade. It brought the community together. It was just fun and safe. You could let your kids go off and walk around . . . My kids really enjoyed it. I think it was our kids' first step in feeling like they belong in the community."

Since August 2012, Morrison and her husband, John, have lived at 1344 W. Draher Rd., the home that once belonged to radio actor Brace Beemer.

From 1941-54, Beemer portrayed the Lone Ranger on the national radio show that originated from WXYZ in Detroit. He lived in Oxford from 1942 until his death in 1965.

"The community really does know this house," Morrison said.

The shoot-off will be divided into two

parts – a competition for experienced shooters only (\$65 per person entry fee) and a novice station for first-time shooters (\$50 per person entry fee).

Fees include cowboy-themed refreshments and a souvenir t-shirt.

The competition will feature four Old West-themed shooting scenarios and is limited to pistols and revolvers up to .45 caliber.

Competitors will be limited to five shots per scenario and they'll score points by doing things like shooting the hat off the villain's head or shooting the gun out of a desperado's hand.

"Kill shots will be worth less," Morrison said. "That's because the Lone Ranger didn't shoot to kill. He shot to rescue the victim. We're trying to keep it in that spirit."

"You get extra points if you come dressed up as a cowboy and you also get extra points if you use a revolver," she added.

Shooters who score the most points will be awarded prizes for first, second and third places.

"Merge Studio is going to be making a

first place trophy," Morrison said. "From what I understand, they do beautiful work, so it's going to be a unique trophy that any shooter would love to have. This won't be something that anybody can go buy at a trophy store."

Competitors must provide their own handguns and ammunition. The range does sell ammunition, but please call ahead (248-693-0567) to make sure they have the appropriate caliber in stock.

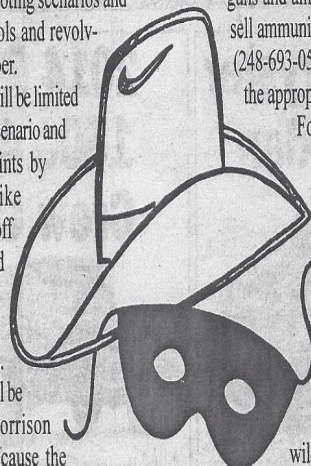
For inexperienced shooters and first-timers, there will be a novice station manned by a National Rifle Association-certified instructor who will show folks how to safely and responsibly handle and shoot firearms.

Firearms and ammunition will be provided by the range at the novice station.

Whether shooting competitively or taking advantage of the novice station, event participants must be at least 15 years old.

Anyone under 18 must be accompanied by a participating, paying adult.

Legendary Wells Fargo stagecoach booked for Lone Ranger parade

A priceless piece of America's famed Old West will return to Oxford this summer, so be on the lookout for bandits like Black Bart.

Rod Charles was pleased to announce the legendary Wells Fargo Stagecoach will once again take part in Oxford's Lone Ranger parade on Saturday, Aug. 2.

"It was so well-received by the crowd (at last year's parade), I was determined to seek a return engagement," he said. "Thanks to my neighbor, Bill Daneluk, I was able to get in touch with the right people to make it happen."

Charles noted Oxford made "such a great, positive impression" on the stagecoach driver during last year's parade that he said, "If you guys do this again, please ask us back."

Pulled by a team of six horses, the Wells Fargo stagecoach once travelled wherever the railroads ended, carrying valuables, mail and even passengers across America's vast plains, treacherous mountains and scorching deserts.

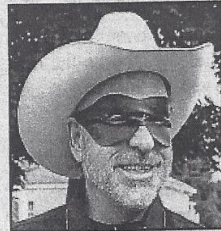
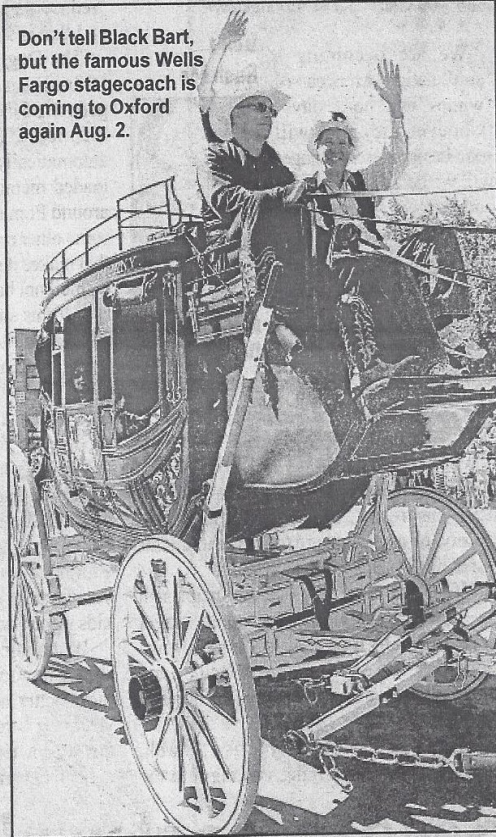
Charles, who chairs Oxford's Lone Ranger Committee and serves on the Downtown Development Authority board, described it as "one of the iconic symbols of the Wild West."

"I'm excited about it," he said. "I thought it had a great impact on (last year's) parade. It adds the aura of the Old West."

"The only thing that troubles me is in my mind, I keep humming that Wells Fargo song from The Music Man," Charles added.

Perhaps, these stagecoaches' most famous cargo was Wells Fargo's distinct green treasure boxes, loaded with 100 to 150 pounds

of gold and/or silver bullion.

Because the Old West was quite often the "Wild West," these stagecoaches were guarded by tough characters, like Wyatt Earp, armed with sawed-off shotguns loaded with deadly buckshot to fend off attacks from das-

tardly outlaws.

Weighing about 2,500 pounds each, Wells Fargo used Concord Coaches, designed and constructed in Concord, New Hampshire, because they were "built high and wide to handle the rough, rutted roads of a new country," according to the company's website www.wellsfargo.com

"The curved frame of the body gave it strength, and perhaps a little extra elbow room," the website states. "Perfectly formed, fitted and balanced wheels stood up to the decades of drenching mountain storms and parching desert heat."

"The unique feature of these coaches was the suspension. Instead of steel springs, the coach body rested on leather 'thoroughbraces,' made of strips of thick bullhide. This feature spared the horses from jarring and gave the stagecoach a (sometimes) gentle rocking motion, leading Mark Twain to call it, 'An imposing cradle on wheels.'"

Wells Fargo paid \$1,100 each for these coaches, which was expensive in the mid-1800s.

Wells Fargo operated its own stagecoach lines from 1866-69. Its coaches ran from Nebraska to California, going through Denver and Salt Lake City in between.

Well Fargo's stagelines ended in 1869 with the completion of the Transcontinental Railroad that linked the Atlantic and Pacific oceans.

After that, the company used independent stageline operators to carry cargo wherever the railroads did not go, a practice it continued into the early 20th century, according to the Wells Fargo website.

Today, Wells Fargo displays 10 original coaches in its historical museum, has 13 on display at various company buildings and uses a fleet of 17 coaches for marketing events and civic, nonpartisan parades across the country.

The Shooter's Stance

Observations from matches

Cowboy attire, as stated in the SASS shooter's manual, "...must be typical of the late 19th century, a B-western movie, or Western television series." Likewise, "Shooters must remain in costume at all match events: dinners, award ceremonies, dances, etcetera. and ALL clothing and equipment MUST be worn appropriately, how it was intended and how it would have been worn in the OLD WEST or as seen on B-Western movies and television."

To this shooter, this means that short sleeves (at least on a gentleman), are a no-no, as well as long sleeves being rolled up. The reason for this is that in the old west, a cowboy would never wear short sleeves and would never have rolled up his sleeves, unless he was washing up in a trough or a creek. A cowboy wore long sleeves to protect his arms from the sun and while riding through brush.

Below is a copy of what is on the currently posted SASS Shooter's Manual (page 26):

The use or presence of any outlawed item is a Stage Disqualification.

Modern shooting gloves.

Short sleeve shirts (Male competitors only)

Short sleeve tee shirts, long sleeve tee shirts, and tank tops for all competitors. Long sleeved Henley type shirts with buttons are acceptable.

Modern feathered cowboy hats (Shady Brads). Straw hats of traditional design (e.g., Stetson, Bailey, sombreros,) are acceptable.

Designer jeans

Ball caps

All types of athletic shoes or combat boots, no matter the material from which they are constructed.

Nylon, plastic, or Velcro accouterments.

The displaying of manufacturer's, sponsor's, or team logos on apparel. Manufacturer's labels on such apparel or equipment are acceptable.

Tennis shoes/sneakers are definitely NOT old west, or even B-Western or TV series. Of course, when weather

conditions are extreme (mud or snow, for example), exceptions are expected to be made. However, it's been noted at more than one match, that several experienced shooters do not wear appropriate footwear on a regular basis. Exceptions are also expected for new shooters that are still acquiring their gear. It's understood that sometimes footwear can be expensive, but so is the leather and hardware that we use. New shooters and those on a budget can possibly find appropriate footwear at a secondhand store or on eBay.

Another thing that has been noticed, is that sometimes people finish shooting their last stage and leave! There is still work that needs to be done so that all the other competitors can finish their last stage as well! Until the last shooter is done and has cleared at the unloading table, there is still a need for spotters, brass rats, target resetters and a timer-operator. Please, be courteous and stay with your posse until everyone has finished the stage, unless you have made arrangements with the posse marshall in advance. On the same note, when you are not at the loading table, shooting or at the unloading table, there are jobs to be done so that the other shooters can take their turn shooting. Please take your turn and offer to relieve someone so they can go shoot. Please do not just sit or talk/text on your phone. Obviously, everyone needs a few minutes to themselves to catch their breath and grab a snack or a drink, but don't leave a select few to do all the work.

If you are not working a position on the posse, and you see observers of your posse, engage them! Invite them closer and explain what we are doing, and how much fun it is! This could be the first time folks are seeing cowboy action shooting, and they may be quite intrigued by the whole game. If they encounter friendly, outgoing people, so prevalent in our sport, they may be interested enough to come watch again, and possibly even shoot. If you are so inclined, and it's appropriate (meaning it's ok with the club and/or the match director), invite them to stick around until the end of the shoot and give a stage a try. A little goodwill goes a long way, and you'll feel great when the visitor is grateful for the opportunity and has a good time. Remember that every shooter on a posse is an ambassador of the sport, and it's up to us to live up to the historical hospitality of the camp fire.
